We received the new light weight helmets mentioned in last month's article. The difference is noticeable and I think it made me look like a young Tom Selleck, at least in my opinion. They are real nice helmets. Also put our new Indian Paks into service. These are used to carry water for wild land firefighting. We are in a drought in the much of Northern Michigan and at a time of year when wild land gear is being put away it may still need to be used.

The good news is the National Weather Service has predicted higher than normal precipitation this winter so we have that going for us.

With the dry weather there have been restrictions on outdoor burning. While recreational fires have not yet been banned you do need to contact the DNR to see if you can burn brush and yard waste. They can be reached at 1-866-922-2876 or online at www.Michign.gov/burnpermit. They will tell you if burning is allowed and what restrictions apply. As always if you are burning, we would like a call so if we are notified of a fire in your area we can investigate before we send out the entire department.

The maintenance on our equipment continues with our trucks being sent out for maintenance, needed repairs and pump testing. We also spent part of a meeting night serving the many gas engines on our equipment. While we are moving towards battery powered equipment, we still have and probably always will have gas powered gear.

Sugar Island Township News

As our colors are in full display, we are reminded that the weather is changing, fog is becoming a more frequent visitor, and our large furry friends with horns are moving across our yards, and roadways. Please be careful when driving.

Please mark November 5th on your calendars. If you haven't voted, please make it a point to do so. Our Township has over 700 registered voters, which is an increase of about 50 from four years ago. In 2020 we had more than 400 voters participating in the process. I'd like to see us exceed 500 of our voters participate. Please vote. Additionally, if you go to the polls on November 5th, please take a moment to thank the volunteers that run the election for the Township. It is a very detailed and complicated process to do properly, and these volunteers have been doing a great job representing Sugar Island Township.

As you may have seen or heard, Spectrum is now doing surveys on the Island for the purpose of developing a detailed plan for bringing fiber optic cable to the residents of Sugar Island. Please be careful when driving around these folks as they do their jobs. Spectrum received a \$15.9M grant from the state MIHI office. Last year I invited representatives of the MIHI office to take a tour of Sugar Island. I drove them around the Island, showing them the geography and the geology, the strengths and challenges we encounter, and the need for bringing broadband to our people. Consequently, we are now the benefactors of a huge grant permitting Spectrum to run fiber optic cable next spring. It is important to note this grant must be executed by the end of 2026. Please keep in mind this service will also include cable tv, wireless and home phone options.

The Township faces a deadline in December to obligate the remaining funds from the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds we received several years ago. These funds are somewhat restricted, so we'll be looking at a limited number of options. One of these options is bringing water to the North Transfer Station. We can either dig a well or we can run a line from the Fire Barn. Additionally, we are looking at installing a toilet facility at the North Transfer Station similar to those at the parks. We don't yet have any quotes so anybody interested in this work should contact me at SITwpSupervisor@gmail.com.

And finally, the Township Board will be looking at renewing millages for Ambulance, Fire and Solid Waste next year. With the recent consolidation of the Ambulance unit under the Fire Department, and the new agreement with Soo Fire, we may have an opportunity to reduce the Ambulance millage. It is not yet clear how the budget will be affected by the agreement with Soo Fire, but we are gathering data now and will be prepared to address the issue in the very near future.





Dear Sugar Island Township Voters:

It has been my pleasure to serve the Township for the last 3 ½ years and I am running to be re-elected in the November 5, 2024 election. Unlike many elected officials I cannot and will not take sole credit for the significant things we've been able to accomplish over that period. Our Township's representative democracy requires a formal vote of the Township Board to make decisions, therefore requiring at least three votes to get anything done. So, in this message I intend to talk about the things I've contributed on behalf of the Township.

When I went around the Island prior to the last election, the biggest complaints included "out of control spending," the lack of oversight for board members and employees, and the apparent lack of board discipline highlighted by numerous examples of preferential treatment to friends of certain officeholders. I immediately began work to establish procedures for governing the conduct of Township business. We developed a purchase order process that establishes firm controls on how our public funds are spent. It requires a check and balance system that eliminates the previous practices that allowed individual board members and certain employees to spend public funds without any oversight. These new policies also redirected the way certain employees had been conducting business because the expenditure of funds now requires Board oversight. I know the public recognized these problems and sent a resounding message when my predecessor was overwhelmingly voted out of office by a three to one margin in the August 2020 primary election. I heard you very clearly and I've tried to influence the changes you suggested. A three to one vote margin suggests that I had a mandate, and I have operated that way.

We began by eliminating conflicts of interest on Township Boards. I also worked with the Fire and Ambulance Department leaders to revise their operating procedures. The Board reviewed and approved these new documents in a way that had never been done in nearly 20 years. I have joined the St. Mary's River Keepers, a Harbor Safety Committee and currently serve as the organizational Secretary. This organization meets with representatives of the US Army Corps of Engineers and the US Coast Guard on a regular basis. This organization is currently working closely with the Corps of Engineers to develop a trail on Island #1. The Township agreed to join the EUP Connect Consortium, and I was elected as the Chairman of that entity. This Consortium works to bring internet broadband to the EUP. Through our advocacy efforts, the State of Michigan's High Speed Internet office has allocated funding to bring broadband internet to Sugar Island. During the Covid Pandemic I initiated the practice of conducting Zoom meetings and I personally ran the meetings using that modality. I also led the practice of allowing our children to use the Community Center. I also coordinated with the EUP intermediate School District to provide us with an internet booster to assist the children on the Island that don't have internet at home. These activities were possible because of my experience and education.

You have a choice, and I encourage you to actively participate in the process. Please vote. You had the same choice four years ago and you chose me. The only difference now is that I did what I told you I would do. If I am re-elected, I promise to continue representing all voters, not just those that vote for me. For those that don't already know me, you can be assured that I will continue to make tough calls until the voters decide otherwise.

My list of things to do in the next four years includes the following:

- 1. Bring broadband internet to Sugar Island. This effort requires constant coordination with the EUP Connect Consortium and various offices with the State of Michigan. The Consortium is actively engaged in the grant-writing process and has just received an \$857,000 MITTEN grant from the NTIA to establish a comprehensive digital literacy program focused on serving Native Americans, veterans, seniors, individuals with disabilities, those in poverty in rural populations. My participation as the Chair of the EUPCC ensures Sugar Island residents are afforded an opportunity to benefit directly from my efforts. I've also received information recently that Spectrum has signed a contract with the State to fulfill a \$15.9M grant that will bring fiber optic cable and Broadband Internet to Sugar Island. Spectrum has been on the Island for a couple weeks doing surveys and gathering data to begin laying fiber in the spring.
- 2. Serve on the EUP Regional Planning & Development Board to ensure Sugar Island, and other rural Townships have a seat at the table when services are discussed. My selection to that Board was effective in August 2024.
- 3. Serve as a primary office holder (Secretary) for the St. Mary's River Keepers, a Harbor Safety Committee, a Michigan Nonprofit Corporation and 501(c)(3). This entity is working with the Corps of Engineers and local trail organizations to create a multi-functional trail on Island #1.
- 4. Work with the Chippewa County Road Commission to pave Village Road. This is fully dependent on the CCRC's paving schedule and the availability of funds. I will work with them to establish an agreement, approved by the Township Board, to get the paving completed as soon as possible. It is important to note that most of the culverts recently replaced by the CCRC were jointly identified in coordination with the CCRC's Engineer.
- 5. Work with the Chippewa County Road Commission to lift, widen and pave portions of 3 Mile Road, Haypoint Road, and Townhall Road. This is a two-step process: widen and lift first, then pave the next year or the year after. I will work with them to establish an agreement, approved by the Township Board, to get this process started in the next four years.

And finally, our Township's improved performance is being recognized at every level within Michigan as is evidenced by the way these entities are reaching out to me. We need to elect serious candidates who have demonstrated an ability to get things done in a way that is transparent, legal, and in keeping with the wishes of most taxpayers. I urge you to select the candidates that have demonstrated the ability over the last four years to do the job.
